A. WILLIAM ELLERY CHANNING	1. Former UUA President and former director of Amnesty International
B. JOHN MURRAY	2. Founder of the First Unitarian Church of Philadelphia and discoverer of oxygen
C. OLYMPIA BROWN	3. 19th-century Transcendentalist writer, educator, feminist
D. KING JOHN SIGISMUND	4. 19th-century Universalist minister who served both Unitarian and Universalist churches and kept California from leaving the Union during the Civil War; famously credited with saying, "The one [Universalist] thinks God is too good to damn them forever, the other [Unitarian] thinks they are too good to be damned forever."
E. WILLIAM F. SCHULZ	5. Inventor of the World Wide Web (www) (proposed in 1989)
F. LEWIS MCGEE	6. Free black poet and abolitionist
G. JOSEPH PRIESTLEY	7. Teacher and reformer of jails and prisons; advocate for people with mental illness
H. MARGARET FULLER	8. Transcendentalist minister who left a Unitarian pulpit over the issue of communion; known for lectures and essays including "Self-Reliance"
I. SOPHIA LYON FAHS	9. Preacher of the sermon "Unitarian Christianity" which laid out the principles of early American Unitarianism
J. NORBERT CAPEK	10. Nurse who organized the American Red Cross
K. LYDIA MARIA CHILD	11. King of Transylvania who issued the first Edict of Religious Toleration
L. RALPH WALDO EMERSON	12. Brought Universalism from England to the U.S.; helped end the practice of taxes paid to the established church
M. TIM BERNERS-LEE	13. First woman ordained by the Universalists (1863); fought for voting rights for women
N. FRANCES ELLEN HARPER WATKINS	14. Founder of the Benevolent Fraternity of Unitarian Churches, serving poor people in Boston; "father of American social work"
O. JOSEPH TUCKERMAN	15. Unitarian minister killed during the fight for civil rights at Selma, Alabama (1965)
P. CLARA BARTON	16. Republican U.S. president, Supreme Court justice, and President of General Conference of Unitarian and Other Christian Churches
Q. WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT	17. Religious educator whose curricula and inspiration profoundly shaped mid- 20th-century Unitarianism
R. THOMAS STARR KING	18. First African American minister of a Unitarian congregation, the Free Religious Fellowship in Chicago
S. DOROTHEA DIX	19. Brought Unitarianism to his native Bohemia (now Czech Republic); died a Nazi prisoner; introduced the Flower Service now commonly celebrated as Flower Communion
T. JAMES REEB	20. Wrote both fiction and non-fiction to promote abolition, women's rights, and Indian rights
